

Dear Sir
 Quebec 19 July 1782

I have done myself the pleasure to write you from London and Portsmouth which I hope will come safe to hands, and I at present have very little to add but that I have arrived here after a pleasant & Expedient passage - I on my arrival wrote a few lines to Brogr Johnston who came immediately to see me, and before any time I was introduced to Brogr Halvorso who in reality acted to me like a Brogr, after asking a little of the ordinary news I expatiated matters to them, and wanted their advice, which they both gave their opinion, that I should send the letter to Captain Johnston and would wait myself till called for. Thus I have done and was informed by my worthy friend Brogr Johnston of what passed - I undoubtedly could not expect of course that Captain Johnston would take it well as all matters was done unawarantably but I am happy not only on my account but Brogr Johnston that it was soon over, for his anger is only for a night, and -

Joy and Good will in the morning. I was also inform'd
What he has been enquiring for the Berth to me in Town
though it has not as yet ^{not} put up. as I could not expect
to Engage in any Business here without Learning a little
French I have Boarded myself in a French house in Town
and hope again any Goods offer I can be getting
to undertake it. I had the pleasure this day of a little
Conversation with Captain Robertson who was willing to take
his Goods will. so recommends me to any of your augmen-
taries but as they make it a rule to have three or four
years of any that Engage with them I cannot think
agree to it however if better ^{not} ~~not~~ put up must
I am determin'd to have a fortune ^{not} ~~not~~ put up
North so that I may triumph a little over those
whose triumph'd over me in my adversity. I have
every day since my arrival here have the pleasure
of Brog Robertson Company which affords us mutual
satisfaction for he to me returns your services and
good address and I represent to him the Obedience
as if personally present from thus you may Justly
Judge how happy we must be at our meeting

I hope yet he will deserve the Blessing of the poor
of his Country as well as well as his Uncle does that of
Canada that by giving Employment ^{to} that ignorant idle
sort of people, I mean the phisicians of the Orphanys -
