Perfixed you have Doctor Higgins terms for teaching the science of Chemistry. I expect Mr John Taylor will come to town tomorrow when I shall conduct him to Doctor Higgins. The £500 p annum is the Doctor's charge for foreigners and he has now a Russian with him at that rate.
