My Dear Madam,

I know not whether you will be most surprised at the receipt of this unexpected epistle or at the presumption of the author, but this I will know that you have much more reason to be surprised than offended. You owe to friendship on my part that I have taken such a liberty, and from the same sentiment on yours, I expect it will not offend.

It will serve to inform you that about three months ago I saw all your relations at Quebec. A severe series of bad health in the W<sup>t</sup> Indies obliged me last summer to proceed to the continent of America. I landed at Charlestown, South Carolina, went from thence to New York & from that to Quebec. Your relations were well but could not exactly inform me in what part of the Orkneys you were.

Should this ever reach you it will I trust p..... me a line to say that you are well & happy, and should my peregrinations in search of health lead me at any future day towards the Orkneys it will be my direction (?) to your habitation at which I should certainly call. The address of this letter is particular and I conceived it necessary it should be so, least more than one of your name might mislead to some other of these islands.
